

Before he left, Professor Wheelwrigth denated two of his publications to the Mexico City College library: A Critical Introduction to Ethics and a translation of selections from Aristotle's Natural Science. Psychology and The Nicomachean Ethics.

We are grateful for the gifts but we are even more grateful for having had the opportunity to know a Christian gentleman who is trying in the classroom to bring to the minds of his students the fact that there are other things more important than the material in this sad old world of ours

And with all his work and study Professor Wheelwright still has time to interest himself in a totally new field of activities - that of Hispanic culture - even though it meant the learning of a new language, and the need to study and to travel at a time when many men think their academie careers are almost over. We look for ward to seeing him again in our midst What a change there would be in our people's thinking about Latin America if ten or iliteen thousand teachers like Professor Wheelwright came to Mexico every year!
