Aztecas Set For Tilt With Californians

The felines from LaVerne, California will tangle with the Green Wave of Mexico City College Saturday, November 7th, in the Olympic Stadium. Kickoff time is set for 4.00 p. m

The Mexico City College football aggregation will be seeking their first international victory at the expense of the visiting Californians. It seems the green and white clad Aztecas like their foes with claws and the contest should prove quite interesting when the arch-rivals of the "Pumas" of the National University take to the field against the Jaguar eleven.

LaVerne College visiting Mexico for the first time, is a four year college founded in 1891 and boast a long standing record in the field of sports activities and football. The ability of the Leopards to take care of themselves on a football field is shown by the caliber of the opponents on their schedule and it is to be noted that a college of rather small attendance plays schools like Pepperdine College, Arizona State and Cal Poly. In 1952 they defeated Cal Tech 21-20, Cal Poly 28-21 and the University of Redland 28-14. The 1952 record shows five wins, three losses and one tie with a San Diego service team.

The LaVerne college athletic team is free lancing and thus are able to play teams in the Southern

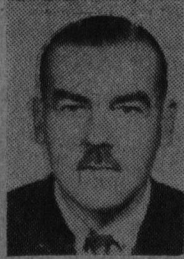

Here is some recent news about some alumni:

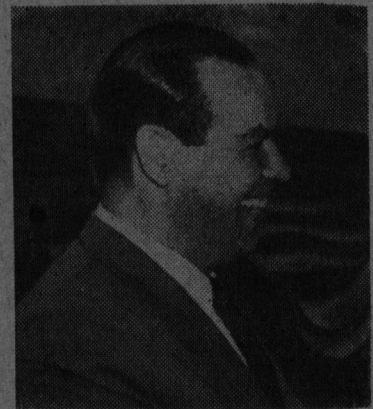
CHARLES MOORE of El Paso, now working with American Air Lines flew to Mexico recently for one of the Saturday Football tilts.

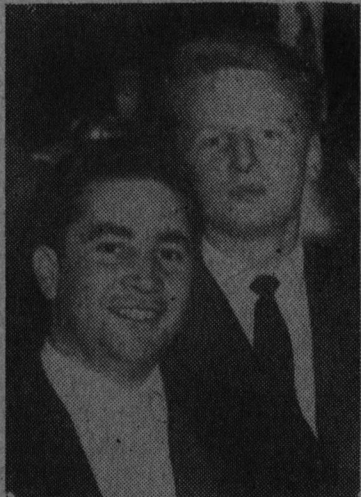
Two rewest members of the Los Angeles Chapter are BILL and LUCILLE MATHEWS, who left Mexico City in June of '53. Bill

Betty Anne Burdick

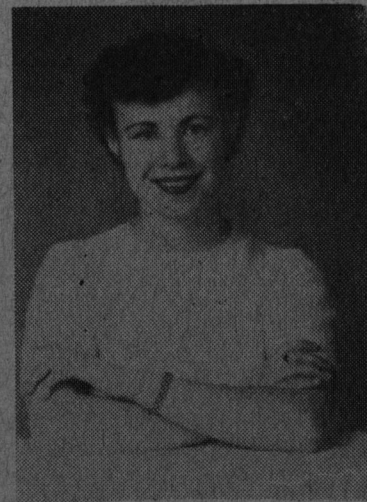
